

- Fun fact: In America, we list people as first name, last name (i.e. Sue Smith). In China it's the opposite (Smith Sue).





## PLOT SUMMARY

# MAKE A FIRE BREATHING DRAGON

#### **Materials**

- Paper roll (toilet paper, paper towel roll or wrapping paper roll)
- Green or red construction paper
- 2 medium pom poms
- 2 small pom poms
- 2 googly eyes
- Red, yellow & orange tissue paper
- Glue stick
- Glue gun

#### Directions

- Cover paper roll with construction paper
- Use glue gun to attach eyes to big pom poms
- Attach pom poms to the paper tube (big as eyes, small as nose)
- Cut tissue paper into 9" or 10" long, pointy strips
- Use a glue stick to attach tissue paper to inside of the tube
- Take a deep breath, put your mouth on the end and blow
